STRATEGY FOR SPELLING SUCCESS

For most learners, spelling well doesn't just happen. It is the result of a conscientious spelling curriculum that:

- 1. provides a menu of skill-building activities that range in sophistication to teach critical concepts at a student's own level,
- 2. uses assessment to gather information to target word study to the specific words each student has not learned from among all previously introduced words in the program, as well as to identify skills not yet mastered,
- 3. equips teachers with guidelines for spelling expectations in everyday writing that increase as students develop as writers, making the classroom a rehearsal for real-world writing, and
- 4. proposes multiple opportunities to engage parents in the acquisition of spelling skills with their child.

This Instant Activity helps teachers achieve item number 1 above—it complements the skill-building component in the SPELLING SOURCEBOOK Series, Second Edition, 2002.



LEVEL OF DIFFICULTY

Approximately Grade 1



PURPOSE

Concept: Some sounds are spelled more than one way.

Skills: homophones, phonics, word analysis, visual skills, sorting words, spelling word patterns, vocabulary development

This Instant Activity grows from the high-use Core Word *to*, word 5 on a frequency-of-use list of writing words. The purpose of the activity is not to specifically teach or reinforce the spelling of *to*, but to springboard from this word to explore multiple words and related language skills. Note that the activity grows many words—the more words with which students have experiences, the better they are able to think, read, and write.



SUGGESTED USE

This Instant Activity can be used to coincide with Activities 2A and 2B, Unit 2, page 8, in Level 1 of the Spelling Sourcebook Series, Second Edition.



TEACHING DIRECTIONS

Write the homophones *to* and *two* on the chalkboard. Discriminate meaning between the words by using them in context sentences (omit *too* for now). Have students brainstorm words that rhyme with the homophones. Write the words on the chalkboard as students suggest them (e.g., *zoo*, *blue*, *new*). Note that some sounds are spelled more than one way. Then sort the words by spelling pattern (e.g., *do*, *to*; *blew*, *crew*, *dew*, *few*, *flew*, *grew*, *knew*, *new*, *stew*; *argue*, *blue*, *clue*, *due*, *glue*, *true*; *boo*, *moo*, *shampoo*,

too, zoo). Discuss meanings of unfamiliar words. Discuss meanings and use of homophones (e.g., blew/blue).

Print the Instant Activity and distribute a copy to each student. Read and discuss the directions to explain what is expected before students begin the exercise.



FOLLOW-UP

Have students work in pairs to proofread their Instant Activities.

For challenge, you may wish to ask selected students to make more word-shape boxes for their classmates to find and write words that fit. The Grid Blackline Master (page 210 in the Level 1 Spelling Sourcebook) or graph paper can be used for this exercise.
